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1486	Richard Salman is an agent for Thomas Pulteney, Lord of Shenley at Blanche Appleton in London. He holds in his own right a lordship measured at three-parts of a knight's fee (the military service due from a lordship) known as Salmons.	Henry VII 1485-1509
1498	Richard Nunny and his wife Joan are holding Salmons in the right of Joan. It is highly likely she is the daughter of Richard. They convey Salmons to John Harvey (or Hervey, who is a clerk) and others.	
1534	The Act of Supremacy – Church of England	Henry VIII 1509-47
1539	Richard Harvey settles (conveys) Salmons, and a farm called Porters, upon himself and his wife Christine for life, with the remainder (estate after their deaths) to Robert Harvey and his male heirs.	
Unknown	Robert and Christine die, and Salmons passes to their oldest son, John.	Edward VI 1547-53
Unknown	John dies leaving a son and heir, also John.	Mary I 1553-58
1595	John and his son Henry convey Salmons to Hugh Catford.	Elizabeth I 1558-1603
Unknown	Hugh conveys Salmons to Sir Richard Coxe of Porters. Sir Richard has served in the royal palace as taster for Queen Elizabeth and King James. He is also one of King James' Clerks of the Green Cloth (a department in the royal household with control of expenditure and with legal authority within the court).	James I 1603-25
1623	Sir Richard dies, and such is his standing that he is interred in Westminster Abbey. Salmons passes to his heir Alban, his brother.	
Unknown	Alban conveys Salmons to Edward Briscoe.	Charles I 1625-49
1638	Edward dies leaving a son and heir Edward.
