1066	<b>Norman Conquest- Battle of Hastings</b>		
1086	<b>Domesday</b> Hutton Mynchon originates from 3 carucates (360 acres) of land held by William the Conqueror.		
1119	Arnald de Percy is the first lord of what will become Hutton Mynchon.		William II 1087-1100 Henry I 1100-35
Unknown	Arnald dies leaving a son and heir also Arnald.		
Before 1169/70	Arnald dies without issue (with no children) so Hutton Mynchon passes to his brother Robert. He dies shortly after leaving his heirs in the custody of Adam de Brus.		Stephen 1135-54 Henry II 1154-89
1170	One of Robert's heirs William is holding Hutton Mynchon.		
Unknown	Stephen Mainevilian gives his name to Hutton Mynchon. He confirms a grant made by his son Roger to Malton Priory.		Richard I 1189-99 John 1199-1216
1215	<b>Magna Carta</b>		
1215-1217	<b>First Barons War</b>		Henry III 1216-72
Unknown	Stephen dies and Roger inherits Hutton Mynchon.		
Unknown	Roger dies leaving a son and heir Robert.

Unknown	Robert dies leaving a son and heir also Robert.	
Unknown	Robert dies leaving a daughter and heir Alice (wife of Alan de Everley).	
1264-1267	<b>Second Barons War</b>	
1272 & 1280	Alice and Alan settle (create a trust for inheritance) land in Thornton and Hutton Mynchon on their son William.	Edward I 1272-1307
Post 1311	William dies leaving a son and heir also William.	Edward II 1307-27
1361	Hutton Mynchon is settled on John de Wandesford jnr., his wife Joan and her heirs.	Edward III 1327-77
Unknown	Hutton Mynchon passes to Thomas de Bolton.	
1375	Thomas dies leaving an infant daughter Mary as his heir. Agnes, his widow marries again, to John Lokton, serjeant-at-law and holds Hutton Mynchon in dower (for life).	
1379	John is impeached for his support of Robert de Vere and condemned to a traitor's death by the "Merciless Parliament". This is commuted to life-long exile in Ireland and the perpetual disinheritance of himself and his heirs.	Richard II 1377-1399
1391	Agnes dies and leaves Mary (now wife of William Lokton) a gown of scarlet with a hood. Hutton Mynchon passes to the Crown and is assigned to Henry Percy (son and the Earl of Northumberland) and others. Mary and William petition for the restitution of Mary's inheritance.	
1401	The legal battle to recover Hutton Mynchon is eventually successful.	Henry IV 1399-1413
1426	William dies leaving a grand-daughter and heir Elizabeth aged 4 (daughter of William's son William).	Henry V 1413-22 Henry VI 1422-61 1470-71
1428	Sir John Gray is recorded as holding an interest in Hutton Mynchon. This may be as a trustee or a subordinate lord.	
1436	Elizabeth dies, whilst still a minor, and leaves Hatton Mynchon to her aunt on her father's side, Elizabeth Wandesford. An inquiry is held, and Hutton Mynchon is assigned to her uncle Robert Lokton.	

# Lordship of Hutton Mynchon

Date	History of Lordship	Monarchs
1440	Robert makes a settlement (conveyance after he dies thus creating a trust) of Hutton Mynchon on Thomas Gower, Richard Driffield and John Gower.	
1444	Robert makes a new settlement to Thomas Gower and Thomas Witham.	
1445	Robert dies leaving a life interest in Hutton Mynchon to his widow Alice and his sister Elizabeth. Then it will pass to Thomas Gower and Thomas Witham. Thomas Gower, Richard Driffield and John Gower compound by fine for having acquired Hutton Mynchon in chief without a licence.	
1446	Thomas Gower and Thomas Witham sue Richard Driffield in Chancery for withholding Hutton Mynchon, which they claim they had bought from Robert Lokton.	
1455-1487	<b>War of the Roses</b>	Edward IV 1461-70 1471-83
Unknown	The trustees are sued by John Mowbray (great-great-grandson of Hawise, sister of the last Thomas de Bolton). His assertion is that Robert Lokton had enfeoffed (granted Hutton Mynchon for a service /fee) to Thomas Gower, Richard Driffield and John Gower, for the benefit of his sister Elizabeth, with the reversion (after her death) to John Mowbray.	
1482	Thomas Gower is knighted by the Duke of Gloucester in Scotland.	
1485	Sir Thomas dies leaving a brother and heir Sir John.	Edward V 1483 Richard III 1483-5
1513	Sir John dies on the field at the Battle of Flodden leaving a son and heir Sir Edward.	Henry VII 1485-1509 Henry VIII 1509-47
1534	<b>The Act of Supremacy – Church of England</b>	
1547	John Thorp is holding a subordinate lordship to Sir Edward.	Edward VI 1547-53 Mary I 1553-58
1579	Sir Edward dies leaving a grandson and heir Thomas.	Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1592	Thomas dies leaving a son and heir Sir Thomas, Baronet.	
Unknown	Sir Thomas is appointed Marshall of Berwick and Wark Castles.	James I 1603-25
Unknown	Sir Thomas is appointed Governor of Eyemouth Fort.

1642-1651	<b>English Civil War</b>	Charles I 1625-49
1651	Sir Thomas dies leaving a son and heir also Sir Thomas.	
1654	Sir Thomas transfers all his holdings in Hutton parish including Hutton Mynchon to his second son Doyley, his daughter Mary (and her husband George Mountayne) with Edward, William, Margaret and Margery.	
Unknown	Most of the holdings pass to Mary Gower and George Mountayne.	Charles II 1660-85 James II 1685-88
1689	This is the last record in which Hutton Mynchon is recorded as a separate entity.	William III 1688-1702
