1535/6	Uphall is leased to Thomas Ewen.		

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1539	King Henry dissolves the Abbey and Uphall escheats to the Crown.	
1540	Uphall is leased to Miles Bowdyshe.	
1541	King Henry grants Uphall to Morgan Phillips (or Wolfe) the King's goldsmith and sewer (servant) of the Chamber.	
1550	King Edward makes a further grant and makes Uphall to be rent free.	Edward VI 1547-53
1552	Morgan dies leaving a son and heir Julian.	
1554	Julian sells Uphall to Richard Flower, citizen and haberdasher of London.	Mary I 1553-58
Unknown	Uphall passes to John Burre and his son Thomas.	Elizabeth I 1558-1603
1595	John and Thomas sell Uphall to Thomas Carewe of Stone, Kent. Thomas complains to the Court of Chancery that Uphall is encumbered with leases and agreements.	
1596	Thomas conveys Uphall to Wessell Weblin, a naturalised German.	
1611	Wessell dies leaving Uphall in dower (for her life) to his widow Elizabeth, then to Wessell Weblin (son to his cousin Nicholas). A third of Uphall is seized by the Crown as an escheat (returns to the state where no heir). The Crown grants this third to Nicholas.	James I 1603-25
1624	Nicholas dies and a third of Uphall descends to his eldest son Nicholas.	
1640	Nicholas is last recorded as lord of Uphall until it disappears from records.	Charles I 1625-49
